# LEARNING THROUGH PLAY IN OUR JUNIOR SCHOOL

# What is Learning through Play?

At times during the day, children direct the learning using spaces and materials thoughtfully chosen or arranged by the teacher to encourage their personal interests and inclinations.

## How does this help our students learn?

Teachers observe closely, usually without interrupting the play. They then use this information to develop provocations for the following days or weeks, or identify ways to extend the learning through direct instruction or using further resources in future sessions. As the children have led the learning in this direction, they are usually engaged and eager to learn. This interest can also be drawn out into curriculum areas where direct instruction is already occurring - reading, writing and mathematics.

#### Provocation

Experiences set up in response to children's interest or ideas to provoke thinking. It is usually a hands-on exploration.

# But why?

In the past, children would go off in groups on their own for hours and play for long periods of time without adult



interruption, but the world has changed for our children.

Whether they are at school, after school activities, in front of screens or being watched on the playground, this new generation is not getting enough uninterrupted child-led play, and this is a problem.

Play is crucial for developing the brain. It is in these uninterrupted (by adults) and unstructured play times that mental processes develop that help us work toward achieving goals - like planning, decision making, manipulating information, switching between tasks, and inhibiting unwanted thoughts and feelings. These processes are an early indicator of school readiness and academic performance.

The more time spent in structured activities the less children are able to make decisions, regulate emotions and behaviour and set goals. The teachers set up time for children to have unstructured play and draw the learning out of the experience, highlighting it for the child, gifting vocabulary for development and valuing the learning within the play. When children see their interests taken seriously, they take learning seriously.
